




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AYIA NAPA



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The name Ayia Napa is derived from a Venetian-era monastery of the same name, located in the centre of the town, next to the square that acts today as a nightlife hub. The word "Ayia" (Agia) means "holy" in Greek. "Napa" is archaic and means "wooded valley" or dell, since in ancient times the area surrounding the town was covered with thick forest.

Geographically, Ayia Napa lies near Cape Greco on the eastern part of Cyprus, just south of Famagusta, and forms part of a larger area known as Kokkinochoria ("Red Villages", a name derived from the red colour of the soil). Ayia Napa is about 8 kilometres (5 mi) from Protaras, a town that has recently seen similar development, but still manages to remain low-key and remains more favourable for families and local Cypriot.

PROTARAS-PARALIMNI

Protaras-Paralimni is situated on the southeastern fringe of Cyprus and has the privilege of seeing the first sunrise in Europe. Paralimni, the main town, combines the advantages of a traditional village with the conveniences of a contemporary town, and there is an air of timelessness in the Town Center.

Protaras, the tourist area, extends along the eastern coast of Paralimni and stretches for 10km from the district of 'Kapparis' to the location of 'Konnos'. Hundreds of windmills grant its landscape a quaint, tranquil beauty. Fantastic beaches with crystal clear waters are found along this coast, most of them accredited with the prestigious Blue Flag status.

The lengthy seaside promenade is perfect for a sunset stroll or a leisurely bicycle ride, offering visitors the opportunity to explore the area further. Visit the harbors of Agia Triada and the picturesque Agios Nicolaos. Follow a nature trail or one of the cycling paths and enjoy seamless views of the sea. Along them you'll discover rare species of flora and fauna and you'll be greeted by little chapels, such as Agioi Saranta, which is set in a mountain cave, or Agios Ioannis, a little chapel hidden in a valley. The ascent of the 153-steps leading to the chapel of Profitis Elias will definitely reward you with breathtaking

views of Protaras.

Hotels, self-catering apartments, a wide range of restaurants, taverns, pubs and clubs are here to cater to the needs of even the most demanding tourist. Therefore, whether you choose to simply soak up the sun, explore the underwater world, wander the quaint streets of Paralimni, visit Byzantine churches or enjoy yourself in a club, once you are in Protaras-Paralimni a world of choices awaits you!

Fig Tree Bay



Fig Tree Bay is the most precious gem on this coastal tiara and is named after the solitary fig tree that was planted here by eastern invaders

in the 17th century. On the headland of the bay one can see the recently revealed, glass-covered Hellenistic tombs. A selection of watersports abounds at these beaches, ranging from skiing and paragliding to snorkeling and scuba diving, and boats wait on the piers to take you on unforgettable trips. The bay also has excellent facilities, with sun beds and parasols available for hire. It provides disabled access and is serviced by a lifeguard.

The Agios Georgios Churches



The town square of Paralimni is dominated by the metropolitan, three-aisled church, dedicated to St George, the patron saint of the

town. The church was finished in 1966 in a

traditional Byzantine style and is full of contemporary frescoes. The impressive fresco which decorates the dome depicts the "All Powerful" surrounded by the Archangels, the Prophets and numerous saints.

The gothic church of St. George is located next to the metropolitan church in the main square of Paralimni. According to a marble inscription, it was erected in 1859 in the place of an older byzantine church, parts of which have been incorporated in this one. Part of its northern wall is covered with a large fresco depicting St. George killing a dragon.

Agios Nicolaos Fishing Harbour



The small scenic harbor of Agios Nicolaos is located in the resort of Pernera and is overlooked by the chapel of Agios Nicolaos, which adds

some island colour to the place. Visitors can rest and have a coffee while enjoying fine views of the sea and the harbour and watching the boats come and go. At sunset the whole scenery is even more breathtaking.

Agios Nicolaos Chapel



In an attempt to honor their protector Saint, everyone involved in marine professions in Paralimni decided to build a chapel dedicated to him. The perfect place was found next to the sea overlooking the harbor where they tie their boats. Small in size, whitewashed with blue painted dome, the chapel of Agios Nicolaos, reminds one of the chapels found on Aegean islands.

Profitis Elias Chapel



The Byzantine Church of Prophet Elias was built in 1984, in the place of an older chapel. Set on a 100m high granite hill and found just a short

distance from the heart of Protaras, it certainly cannot be missed. It was built using stones from the area, and it is in perfect harmony with its natural surroundings. The chapel is especially awe-inspiring in the evenings when it is floodlit.

Agioi Saranta Chapel



Taking the loose surface road to the area of Agioi Saranta or one of the nature trails, one comes across the picturesque chapel of Agioi Saranta.

Its existence is betrayed by the stone-built canopy on the wild rocks, as the chapel is set in an intact cave. The forty stalactites of the cave are what encouraged a devout christian to turn it into a place of pilgrimage. Apart from the pilgrimage, visitors can enjoy the wonderful scenery that surrounds the chapel.

Agia Anna Church



This 13th century Byzantine chapel in the center of Paralimni, built using local limestone, is dedicated to Mother Mary but it is referred to

as 'Agia Anna', a name that was given to it when it was restored. The original chapel was decorated with frescoes, which were tragically destroyed and only some remnants betray their previous existence. The chapel now serves as an ecclesiastical museum where icons of the 16th and 19th centuries, holy relics and old books are exhibited.

Kapparis Beach



Kapparis beach (a recipient of the Blue Flag accreditation) is found north of Protaras, in the homonymous district of Kapparis. It is also known

as the beach of MMAD, named after the training center of the Police Rapid Response Unit (MMAD), located nearby. It is a small, fine golden sandy beach with clear waters and is very popular with locals and tourists happy to give the hectic beaches a miss. There are sun loungers and parasols available for hire, and the area is patrolled by a lifeguard.

Paralimni Lake



Paralimni is situated next to a seasonal lake which forms west of the community, between Paralimni and Sotira. This is actually a natural

hollow which collects rainwater from all parts of Paralimni and the neighbouring hills during the winter season. The lake has been part of the NATURA 2000 network since 2009, as it forms the natural habitat of an abundant and important population of the protected grass snake, Natrix Natrix Cypriaca, and as a large number of migrating and nesting birds find shelter here.

Windmills



The windmills made their first appearance in Paralimni in the beginning of the twentieth century and were used by farmers to

pump water up for the irrigation of their fields. Soon they multiplied in number, and as a result, Protaras, its most productive area, is often referred to as the land of windmills. The windmills were later replaced by mechanical pumps. Today, the large number of windmills testifies the productivity of the past while affording a quaint, nostalgic beauty to the landscape of the area.

Traditional Taverns



No stay in Protaras-Paralimni would be complete without a visit to a traditional tavern. In the taverns of Protaras and the main

town of Paralimni you can enjoy authentic, traditional Cypriot cooking. The local cuisine is rich and has a huge diversity of dishes. Most of the chefs use locally grown ingredients, a multitude of herbs and vegetables and recipes that have been passed on from generation to generation, always adding new touches. "Meze", the national speciality, is in essence a culinary cross section, consisting of a variety of dishes. It starts with dips and salads followed by grills, side dishes and desserts. Koupepia are vine leaves stuffed with minced meat and rice, and Tava is tasty stew of meat, herbs and onions. Enjoy your meals while sampling an excellent selection of local wines. So "Kopiaste", relax and discover the flavours of Protaras.

Coastal Promenade



The seaside promenade extends for more than 4 kilometers, joining the area of Pernera with Fig Tree Bay, as well as Ayios Nicolaos Harbor with

Louma Beach. It allows the visitor further to explore the area and at the same time come across a wealth of attractive beaches.

This lengthy promenade is perfect for a sunset stroll or jogging while enjoying stunning views across the Mediterranean. All along the coastal promenade there are platforms that extend from the main path towards the sea. Some of these resting points look as if they hang over the sea. These stops are also marked by benches and people make frequent stops to rest, enjoy the view, the sunset or sunrise or read a book.

Archangelos Gabriel Church

1965, during the building of the chapel, a stone cross sculpture was found in the area, proof that in the past there was a church here. This cross was incorporated in the new chapel. In 1998 the chapel was restored and its walls were decorated with frescoes.

The Traditional Cypriot House



The Traditional Cypriot House is located in the old center of Paralimni. It was built in the 19th century and has been carefully renovated to

maintain its distinctive character. Its traditional arches together with the local flowers planted in its fore-yard make the house particularly beautiful. Household utensils and farming tools used by a typical rural family of the region are on display in the three rooms as well as in the courtyard. Besides serving as a museum, the house is at the disposal of couples wishing to have a traditional backdrop for their wedding.

There is a wealth of attractions and places to visit, both beautiful and interesting. Be sure to visit the Monastery and the Old and New Church dedicated to Virgin Mary, the picturesque harbor, the Municipal Museum ''Thalassa'', the Makronissos Archaeological Tombs, the Venetian Aqueduct, and the rural churches and chapels all around town, as well as the Sculpture Park, the Love Bridge, and the iconic ''I Love Ayia Napa'' sculpture in the Central Square.

Cape Greco National Forest Park



Explore the multitude of intriguing nature trails lined with pine trees and a diverse botanical splendour whilst pausing to take in the spectacular

views from the sea cliffs looking down to the

beautiful Mediterranean Sea. Many benches are spread out along these trails to take a break from the walk and admire the surroundings in stillness. One of these nature trails forms part of the European Long Distance Trail E4, running from Cyprus to Gibraltar. Then there's the Aphrodite nature trail which stretches 2 km along the North-East coast of Cape Greko which doubles up as a Cultural Route due to the mythical birth place of Aphrodite. A lovely monument to visit is the tiny white washed church of Agoi Anargyroi, with steps that lead down to the sea where there is a place where Holy water runs. Another trail leads to the 'Cyclops' cave where there is a picnic site close by.

Specially made cycling paths are strewn throughout. Cyprus has the ideal climate for cycling all year round with low annual rainfall and light winds. Thirty foot high limestone cliffs have caves which have been hewn by Mother Nature. Taking a boat trip along the coast you will see that they are really striking, which is why they have been aptly named the 'Palaces'. Cape Greko has warm sea temperatures ranging from 16 to 28 degrees and visibility reaching up to 40 metres. For this reason, as well as for the wonderful scenery and the marine life, this area is very popular with divers.

Thalassa Ayia Napa Municipal Museum



This museum has the sea as its subject-matter. The exhibits cover a chronological span, from pale ontological and prehistoric periods until present times, and include among other things an exact life size replica of the ancient ship of Kyrenia of the Classical period (400 BC), the replica of a Mesolithic (9200 BC) papyrus vessel, a traditional Cypriot boat from 19th century, known as "Passara", Cypriot antiquities, bones and skulls of endemic pygmy hippopotamus and elephants of Cyprus (8000 years old), and fossilized exhibits such as sea-urchins and corals. Moreover, visitors can admire stuffed fish, mammals, sea turtles and marine organisms, such as shells, barnacles, corals, sea-urchins, starfish, crabs, lobsters, sponges, marine plants and more found in various parts of the island.

Ayia Napa Monastery



A landmark in the heart of Ayia Napa, the Monastery is the most important sight in town. It is easily accessible by all visitors, as it is located

in the central square, about two kilometers away from the Harbour. Among some of the well known visitors of the monastery was the Greek Nobel laureate Giorgos Seferis, who was astounded by the beauty he faced when he visited the place. He decided to dedicate a hymn to the Monastery, and thus wrote the poem "Ayia Napa B" which can be found in his collection of poems "Emerologio Katastromatos C" (Logbook III).

There is an uncertainty as to when the Monastery was initially built. The cave, the hiding place and the well, witness the presence of a Christian community there since the Byzantine years (11th century). The first element of the temple (13th-14th century) was built during the Frankish period, while the rest of the Monastery was completed during the 15th century. However, the Monastery as it stands nowadays is a construction of the 15th century, a time during which Cyprus was under the Venetian regime.

Ayia Napa Harbour



The picturesque Ayia Napa Harbour is undoubtedly one of the main features of the town, after the Medieval Monastery and Cape

Greco. Many decades ago, the harbour was just a small bay with a few fishing boats. In the beginning of the 70s, the first breakwater was constructed which basically marked the beginning of the current development of the harbour . Nowadays, the Harbour is fully renovated with a large fleet of fishing boats, speed boats, sailboats and cruise ships. The land area is appropriately formed with pedestrian lanes which lead to the two lighthouses. Colourful and typically picturesque, the area around the harbour includes an open theatre, fountains, quaint cafes, fish taverns and restaurants. The ambiance around the harbour is a real ornament and it is rightfully classified among the most contemporary and picturesque harbours in Cyprus.

The Ayia Napa Aqueduct




The Agia Napa Aqueduct is one of the most important monuments preserved within the boundaries of the Agia Napa municipality. The

Aqueduct supplied the monastery and the whole region with water for hundreds of years. The monument in its present state of preservation is an alteration of the original Roman aqueduct, occurred during the Frankish period when the monastery was built. The source of the water is to be found somewhere on the Northeastern hills of Ayia Napa. Up to the year 1974 the original visible route of the channel was marked by a barrel-shaped structure at the locality of 'Mana tou Nerou', known traditionally as the House of the Greeks. From that point the aqueduct ran all the way to the monastery following the natural contours of the bedrock.

Makronissos Tombs



The Makronisos cemetery includes 19 Hellinistic and Roman tombs (2400 BC). The entrances were originally closed with one large or two smaller

calcarenite slabs. Among the findings at the sight are clay sarcophagi which were originally covered with three flat tiles and a limestone Korre statuette (both displayed in the Thalassa Municipal Museum).

Sea Caves



The Sea Caves or "Palatia", as they are called, are certainly one of the main features of Ayia Napa and the centre of attraction for

thousands of locals and tourists.

The Sea Caves, which are found between Kermia Beach and the Cavo Greco Cape, have a tremendous geological history and are of social, environmental and economic importance to Ayia Napa.

A visit to the sea caves is a must for an enjoyable walk and a close view of the captivating scenery, designed by nature and time, and a dive into the crystal waters of the sea is a treat.

The geology of the sea caves is one of the determinant factors of Cavo Greco, which has been declared a protected area.

Sculpture Park

Ayioi Anargyroi Chapel



The chapel is found on the Eastern side of the town and is devoted to Ayios Kosmas and Ayios Damianos, or the Omosianoi Saints as they

called them, both doctors who treated and cured patients without receiving any payment. According to tradition, during their journeys in the area, they faced rough seas and their boat was carried away into a cave which has since been turned into a chapel. At a later stage, the new chapel was built on the rock right above the cave.

The Saints' blessed water "Ayiasma" is found in the cave under the rock. Church services are held on the 1st of July and the 1st of November.

Meze is often the dish of choice for local Cypriots, ordering them for feasts, celebrations, anniversaries and other joyous occasions. It starts light with salads, dips, olives and fresh bread. Then you start to work your way up with snails, octopus in red wine, pickled capers and greens, followed by grilled halloumi (Greek cheese made from sheep and goat's milk), smoked pork, fish, keftedes (meatballs), sheftalia and traditional Greek sausages. Then come the kebabs, chicken and lamb chops.

Cyprus coffee is served literally everywhere on the island. Such is its popularity- a perfect accompaniment for playing games or just shooting the breeze. Cyprus coffee is very different from European coffee, in that it is brewed in small pots with long handles called 'mbriki'. The coffee itself is made from fresh finely ground coffee beans and is poured into tinted porcelain cups. The amount of sugar added depends on your taste: 'sketo' (no sugar), 'metrio' (half a teaspoon of sugar), and 'glykis' (a full teaspoon of sugar).

Larnaca International Airport



Larnaca International Airport (LCA) is the nearest airport to Ayia Napa, located about 45 kilometres to the west of the city. It takes about

45-60 minutes to get to the city from the airport depending on you method of transportation and other factors like traffic.

Most major hotels and resorts provide shuttle services, making it the most common and simple way to get to Ayia Napa. There are also usually plenty of taxis available outside the terminal, as well as several car rental companies.

It is possible to get to Ayia Napa using public transport, and it is quite inexpensive, but there is no direct connection, and the trip can take significantly longer (up to about 90 minutes). Take any bus from the airport to Larnaca city centre and change to bus 711 of the intercity bus to Ayia Napa at Finikoudes Promenade. Tickets can be bought directly from the driver on both buses.

Public Transport
