THE CITY

Originally founded as a pearling port over 100 years ago, Broome today continues to produce the world's finest pearls. The 22 kilometres of pristine white sand is called Cable Beach and has been rated one of the top beaches of the world. Not only sand and sea but also the natural phenomenon known as the Staircase to the Moon attract large numbers of visitors to this popular and unique tourist destination in Australia.

Located just south of the equator, the town experiences a sub-tropical climate with warm sunny days and balmy nights. The dry seasons last from May to September and that's when most visitors take the chance to explore the city as well as the Kimberley region.

While Broome has an interesting pearling history, Chinatown, in the heart of the city, continues to lure with its cosmopolitan character and pearl showrooms selling the best of the best to the public.



Passport / Visa



Unless you are a New Zealand citizen granted visa exemption on arrival (in most cases), you will need to obtain a visa prior to visiting Australia.

Citizens of all European Union countries, as well as Andorra, Norway, Iceland, San Marino, Switzerland, Liechtenstein, Monaco, and Vatican City are eligible for an eVisitor visa, which can be applied for online. For citizens of the United States, Canada, Japan, Hong Kong, Singapore, Brunei, South Korea and Malaysia, the Electronic Travel Authority (ETA) entry permit is available, which can be applied for online and grants holders the right to enter Australia an ulimited amount of times for stays of no longer than 3 months per visit.

Citizens of all other world countries (with the exception of Somalia) are also able to apply for a visitor visa online. Health and Safety



When swimming in Broome, pay attention to safety measures against two dangerous kinds of jellyfish, the Irukandji and the Box jellyfish.

They can cause severe health problems, and there have been letal cases, although not in Broome.

These jellyfish are usually around when the water is hot, during the hot season and in the nearby months: approximately October to May. It is best not to go swimming during this period of time.

However, they can be found - more rarely - even during the rest of the year. The best way to protect oneself is to wear a wetsuit. Always read warnings signs at the beach and ask

lifeguards when in doubt. Bring vinegar with you when you go swimming, and pour it on the place where you've been stung if it does happen, then head to the hospital immediately.

Best Time to Visit



Generally, Broome has two seasons: the dry one, from April/May to September, is the best to visit the area; the wet season is very hot and

rainy.

Most tourists visit between June and August, when, in addition to warm weather and clear

skies, it's possible to admire whales migrating off the Northern shore. To avoid most of the crowds, enjoy great swims and beach life, and admire luxurious vegetation right after the wet season, come in June; April and May are also beautiful months, but they're not suitable for swimming due to the presence of potentially dangerous jellyfish (see "Health and Safety"). September can still be enjoyable, but the weather starts to be quite hot.

Broome International Airport



The Broome International Airport is located 2 kilometres from the centre of town and is the hub of North Western Australia. There is no

scheduled bus service from the airport, though hotels and resorts have shuttle bus services. The cheapest transfer from the airport is to walk to Frederick Street and catch the Town Bus Service.

There are taxis just outside the terminal and fares are quite low into town.

Public transport



The town bus service offers regular hourly services seven days a week 7.10am-7.10pm. The buses run between most accommodation and

attractions around Broome including Chinatown

and Cable Beach. Children from 0-16 years ride free when accompanied by an adult. You can buy your ticket from the bus driver.
