#### THE ISLAND

Just off the southeastern coast of Mexico and opposite Playa del Carmen, Cozumel is an important cruise ship port famous with snorkeling and scuba diving enthusiasts for its fascinating reef which is part of the second-largest reef system on earth: the Mesoamerican Reef. White, unblemished beaches stretch north to south, east to west, leaving travelers taken with the island's seemingly endless swathes of sand.

The city of San Miguel de Cozumel is the largest city on the island and the right place to be to get a peek into the mystical Mayan culture and catch a glimpse of Spanish colonial architecture.

The Cozumel of today has recovered from the damage notoriously done by Hurricane Wilma in 2005, warmly welcoming guests from around the world.

# **Punta Sur**



In the very south of the island and part of the largest ecological park on Cozumel, Punta Sur is a tiny piece of heaven on earth made up of white

beaches, turquoise waters, wild flora, exotic birds, and crocodiles in their natural habitat.

Must-do activities include snorkeling, the "El Caracol" Mayan Vestige, and taking in the stunning view from the Celarian Lighthouse.

The fastest way to get here is by booking a private jeep excursion.

#### El Cielo



Famous for its silky white beaches, El Cielo is a mesmerizing hidden gem about 2 miles from the Cozumel coast. It is a popular snorkeling spot

where locals and tourists come to swim among thousands of colorful starfish and stingrays to catch a glimpse of the magical underwater world.

Note that El Cielo is only accessible by boat.

#### **Punta Molas**



One of the most famous sights and one definitely not to be missed is Punta Molas – a picturesque beach in the north of Cozumel. The anchor

point here is the old white-and-red lighthouse surrounded by tropical vegetation and secluded beaches. Punta Molas is where the bright blue of the sky blends with the pristine waters of the Caribbean Sea creating a stunning horizon line.

The fastest way to reach the destination is by jeep (this can be challenging because of the unpaved roads) or tour boat.

palapa-roofed dining area where you can sample the acclaimed local fish tacos.

#### San Gervasio Ruins



Located on the northern part of the island, San Gervasio ruins are an archaeological site of the pre-Columbian Maya civilization and a must-do

excursion for history buffs. The site was originally dedicated to the deity of midwifery and medicine, Ix Chel, and was an important pilgrimage site for Mayan women. Today, the ruins are Cozumel's only preserved Mayan ruins and a noteworthy location to find out more about the fascinating Mayan civilization.

# **Cozumel International Airport**



The island of Cozumel on the Caribbean coast is served by Cozumel International Airport which handles both international and

domestic flights. Approximately 2.8 km (1.7 miles) from the center, taxis and shuttle buses are an easy way to move from the airport to the city center, and vice versa. While hailing a taxi, make sure to have Mexican pesos or US dollars as many taxi drivers do not accept credit cards. Taxi fares start at USD 5 for short rides up to USD 60 for an all-island tour.

#### **Tourist Tax**



Nearly every commercial airline flying into Mexico now includes the Tourism Tax (known as DNI – Derecho No Inmigrante) in the price of each flight

ticket. Request an itemised receipt from your

tour agent or airline, where the DNI charge is normally listed, and present it at check-in and/or immigration in order to avoid double payment.

If, however, your airfare does not include this tax, or if you've been travelling by land, the tax will need to be paid separately. If you're leaving Mexico by air, the easiest way to pay this tax will be at the check-in counter for your departing flight/the airport immigration office. Note that the tax can only be paid in cash, in USD, Mexican pesos or Sterling. The exact fee is subject to change; at the time of writing, it amounts to just under \$30 per person.

If you are departing by land, you are still required to pay this tax, which can also be done at a bank. Note that those arriving by land and departing from Mexico within 7 days are exempt from paying the fee.

The DNI tax is not to be confused with the Mexican Airport Departure Tax, which will be automatically included with any flight ticket purchase, and will also appear on the itemised receipt.

Make sure to hold on to any receipts, slips or documents issued to you by Mexican immigration authorities throughout the entire trip.

# Ferry from Playa del Carmen to Cozumel



If Cozumel is a quick pit-stop on your way to Mexico, read on and find out what's the fastest way to get from the mainland to Cozumel. The fastest

way to reach this island is by ferry from downtown Playa del Carmen. Ferries leave



nearly every hour and the ride lasts approximately 45 minutes. Tickets cost around \$7.00 for adults and \$3.50 for children, and can be purchased at kiosks near the ferry pier.

The company Ultramar has introduced the luxury ferry that takes you to Cozumel in only 20 minutes. The slightly higher prices reflect the service provided on board.

#### Passport/Visa



Visa exemption applies to citizens of all EU countries, most countries in the Americas, Australia, New Zealand, Japan, South Korea, and

more. Both tourists and business visitors from these countries may stay in Mexico for up to 180 days. For Russian, Turkish and Ukrainian passport holders, electronic authorisation (SAE) is required, which then grants travellers from these countries the right of a single entry followed by a stay of up to 30 days. Please consult an official source/consulate in your home country for the latest information on visa requirements.

When travelling to Mexico, you will need to fill out a Forma Migratoria Múltiple (FMM), which is essentially a visitor's permit for Mexico. All travellers are encouraged to do so online prior to travel, and present the printed out document upon entering the country.

#### **Best Time to Visit**



March to June represents the best period to visit the island of Cozumel and enjoy the pleasant temperatures. Cozumel is also a hit spot during the

winter. Being a snow-free island, it is the perfect haunt to soak up the sun. The low season runs from July to November; the island is quieter and accommodation rates are lower, but keep an eye out for hurricanes warnings as they're very frequent during this period. Every season is characterized by a particular event or festivity. Here are some highlights:

- Fiesta of the Virgin of Guadalupe (December)
- Carnaval (February-March)
- El Cedral Festival (April-May)
- Boat Rodeo and Fishing Tournament (May)
- Cozumel Independence Day (September)
- Ironman Cozumel (November)
