THE CITY

Once known as "Manchester of Poland" on account of its numerous brick and cast iron factory buildings, Lodz (pronounced "woodge") is a place that offers something for everyone. It has long been the centre of the vibrant Polish film industry – it is sometimes affectionately known as "Holly-lodz" – and is one of the country's cultural and industrial centres.

A mere 96 miles from Warsaw, Lodz is centred around Ulica Piotrkowska, the city's main pedestrianised boulevard - the longest pedestrianised street in Europe, in fact - which stretches nearly four kilometres from Plac Wolnosci in the north to Aleja Pilsudskiego in the south. Lined with shops and museums, it also contains dozens of grand Baroque, Art Nouveau and Secession-style buildings which once belonged to the city's wealthy industrialists. It is also the location for most of the city's tourist sights as well as many of its better cafés, restaurants, bars and night spots. Other central streets proffer some of the most impressive and opulent palaces and manor homes, especially along ul. Ogrodowa, ul. Gdanska and plac Zwyciestwa.

Lodz is also an incredibly green city, holding over 30 municipal parks. The best one is the verdant Lagiewniki Forest, the largest city park in Europe and a perfect spot for an afternoon stroll.

Passport / Visa



Poland can be visited visa-free for up to 90 days by citizens of most European countries, Australia, New Zealand, Japan, South Korea,

Taiwan, Malaysia, Israel, UAE and most countries in America. If you are unsure whether or not you need to apply for a visa, we recommend contacting the embassy or consulate in your country. International (non-Schengen) travelers need a passport that is valid for at least 3 months after the end of their intended trip in order to enter the Schengen zone. Citizens of Schengen countries can travel without a passport, but must have a valid ID with them during their stay.

Public transport



In terms of size, Lodz is a very manageable city, and most places can be easily walked to. Getting around Lodz with public transport is also simple

and straightforward, since an extensive, modern bus and tram network is spread throughout the city. Buses and trams use the same tickets, available in various denominations.

The Jakdojade website and app are a convenient

and handy tool for anyone trying to navigate Lodz by public transport.

Long-distance trains operate regularly to other Polish cities. Lodz's train station and central bus station are located next to each other on the eastern edge of town a few blocks from the northern end of Piotrkowska. Warsaw is 2.5 hours away by train.




