THE CITY



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Wellington is a compact and walkable city. With a downtown area only 2 km across, most of the major attractions are within easy walking distance from the hotels, cafés, restaurants, bars and shops. The city, originally founded by English settlers in the 1840s, is split into four quarters – Lambton Quay, the best place for shopping; the business area Courtenay Place; the entertainment district Cuba Street, full of cafés and vintage clothing stores that give the neighbourhood a bohemian, alternative vibe; and Waterfront Quarter, which takes in Frank Kitts Park, Waitangi Park, Queens Wharf, and Te Papa.

As well as the historic and cultural attractions, Wellington also offers a little bit of Hollywood glamour – the majority of the "Lord of the Rings" trilogy was filmed in and around the city, and visitors can now follow in the footsteps of Hollywood stars. Wellington is also the ideal launching pad for other great parts of New Zealand, including the wine region of Wairarapa, the coastal destination of Kapiti Coast and Kapiti Island – one of New Zealand's premier nature and marine reserves. Wellington is also the gateway to New Zealand's South Island, with two regular ferry services taking visitors across the Cook Strait to Picton.

There are also many great excursions to choose from such as a trip to the Somes-Maitu Island or exploring the wildlife at Karori.

Wellington's compact downtown area is only 20 minutes from one end to the other, making it ideal territory for shop-hoppers. As one of New Zealand's best dressed cities, fashion is at the core of the Wellington shopping experience.

The Lambton Quarter is the main shopping strip, and here you'll find international chain stores, brand names, and Wellington's most prestigious department store – Kirkcaldie & Stains, which dates back to 1863. Airport



Wellington International Airport is located 8 km or a 20 minutes drive from the city centre. Wellington is less than one hour's flight from

anywhere in New Zealand, and Pacific Blue covers most major cities domestically with flights to Australia and the South Pacific.

A number of shuttle operators provide a regular half-hourly or hourly shuttle bus service between the airport and the Wellington Railway Station. They operate on demand, or you can book in advance to have them waiting for you at Wellington Airport. There are always a couple of shuttles waiting at the departure exits of the airport. They assist you with your luggage, and offer a friendly door-to-door service throughout Wellington city.

Passport / Visa



Citizens of Australia and the UK, as well as visa waiver countries, do not need to apply for a visa for short visitor stays, but may need to produce

documented proof of onward travel. Visa waiver countries include the USA and multiple countries across Europe and Asia, Andorra, Argentina, Austria, Bahrain, Belgium, Brazil, Brunei, Bulgaria, Canada, Chile, Croatia, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hong Kong, Hungary, Iceland, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Japan, South Korea, Kuwait, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Macau, Malaysia, Malta, Mauritius, Mexico, Monaco, Netherlands, Norway, Oman, Poland, Portugal, Qatar, Romania, San Marino, Saudi Arabia, Seychelles, Singapore, Slovak Republic, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Taiwan, United Arab Emirates, Uruguay, and Vatican City. Citizens of other countries will need to apply for a visa in advance, which can be done online for solo travellers and in paper format for those travelling with a partner or as a group. The applicant's passport validity in this case will need to last 3 months after the planned departure date.

Best Time to Visit



According to many, the best time to visit Wellington is the end of the summer, around February and March, when the city becomes

less crowded and the weather more predictable. You will still be able to enjoy New Zealand's superb nature, but you'll also find more interesting events than in summer - and the clearer skies will probably offer you the best sunsets of the year.

Summer lasts from December to February, and is the most popular time to visit, attracting many families with children on school break. These are the hottest months (around 60 to 70° F), but the weather can be unpredictable, with sudden strong winds: dressing in layers is recommended.

Public transport



One of the best features of Wellington is its compact size. In half an hour, you can walk from the Railway Station, past Parliament Buildings,

along Lambton Quay, past Cuba Street to Courtenay Place near Te Papa. Collect a map from the Wellington i-SITE Visitor Centre and explore downtown Wellington for fashion, food, arts and all the main attractions. Or take a guided tour with Walk Wellington. Discover the history, the people and the places of Wellington with knowledgeable guides who know the capital's hidden secrets.

Go Wellington's Flyer is an express bus service that travels between the airport, Wellington city, Queensgate, Lower Hutt and Upper Hutt. The Flyer only stops at the main stops, which makes travel faster and easier. Service runs every 30 minutes between 6.25am and 8.20pm (Monday to Friday) and regularly at the weekend.

Go Wellington is the main public bus operator in Wellington city, running regular scheduled services between the city centre and suburbs. Buses operate every day from 7am-11pm on most routes. Individual tickets may be purchased from the bus driver, and discounted ten-trip tickets are also available.


